The Volcanoes of Alaska.

Aniakchak - Alaska Peninsula Last Eruption - 4,400 7,287 feet 56.88° N 158.17° W

One of the most dramatic calderas of the Aleutian arc, the 10-km-wide Aniakchak caldera was formed around 3400 years ago during a voluminous eruption in which pyroclastic flows traveled more than 50 km north to the Bering Sea and also reached the Pacific Ocean to the south. At least 40 explosive eruptions have been documented from Aniakchak during the past 10,000 years, making it the most active volcano of the eastern Aleutian arc. A dominantly andesitic pre-caldera volcano was constructed above basement Mesozoic and Tertiary sedimentary rocks that are exposed in the caldera walls to elevations of about 610 m. The ice-free caldera floor contains many pyroclastic cones, tuff cones, maars, and lava domes. Surprise Lake on the NE side drains through The Gates, a steep-walled breach on the east side of the 1-km-high caldera rim. Vent Mountain and Half Cone are two long-lived vents on the south-central and NW caldera floor, respectively. The first and only confirmed historical eruption took place in 1931 from vents on the west and SW caldera floor.

Rocks & Minerals Collections in Scotland by Charles Siders A Junior Member

These are some photos of interesting rocks and crystals we saw at the National Museum of Scotland and the Fossil and Heritage Centre in Burray, Orkney.

Below is a large slab of banded ironstone, and on the right is a large amethyst geode.





To the right is some uvarovite, which is one of the rarest types of garnet and is usually found in Spain, Russia and Quebec.

Below is a large chunk of malachite.







The igneous rock on the left formed dark circles of iron minerals as the iron concentrations varied while it was cooling.

Below and to the left is some amazonite, and below is some kyanite, which is found in cyanite.







Above is some wulfenite, a lead molybdate mineral associated with lead ore.



The red in the eclogite on the right is garnet and the green is omphacite. It forms over 45 kilometers deep and at temperatures above 500 C.






Above are two photos of an interesting case they had at the Fossil Centre. The blue john in the left photo and the abalone shell in the right are particularly interesting. Blue john is a form of fluorite and in the UK it is only found in Blue John Cavern and Treak Cliff Cavern.

Balow on the left is a large ammonite and on the right is petrified wood.







When I saw the fossils on the left I thought, "Oh look, septarian nodules. Aww they're only dinosaur eggs". On the right is orthoceras in a limestone matrix. I saw quite a few interesting rocks and fossils at both museums, many of which I had never seen before.
