State Fossils

Vermont State Fossil

Delphinapterus leucas, Beluga Whale, the name means White Whale. Most of the fossils

that I have reported on in the Lithogram have been found only as fossils, but this is one of those that are still living on Earth today. The whale fossil was found in Charlotte, Vermont and is 11,000 years old.

During the construction of the Rutland and Burlington Railroad in 1849 a whale was found in the deposits that were left behind in the Champlain Basin that was formed when the Atlantic Ocean flooded it about 12,500 years ago.

The males can achieve a length of 18 feet

and weigh in at 3,000 pounds and the females can get to 13 feet and weigh up to 2,000 pounds. They have teeth and they have a 'melon' shaped area on their forehead.

It became the Vermont State Fossil in 1993.

Craters of the Moon National Monument & Preserve

We stopped at the Craters of the Moon National Monument in June on our way to Montana to help break up a long road trip and we were very glad we stopped. Located about 2 hours north of Twin Falls, Idaho the park has a number of interesting volcanic features. The lava fields are 15,000 to 2,000 years old. Our first stop was at the Inferno Cone, a large cinder cone (I of 25 in the park) which forms when gas-rich volcanic froth erupts high into the air, breaks into fragments that fall as cinders around the vent, forming a cone. You can hike up a short (but steep) trail to the top.

We took a quick look around at the spatter cones and then headed to the Indian Tunnel, a



lava tube which you can hike through. The 0.8 mile trail to the tunnel is paved but you are walking over rough terrain in the tunnel and over the top to get back to the trail. Great place to stop if you find yourself in Idaho.
