President's Message

I am covering a lot of extra material in my President's Message because none of it could be covered at the Board Meeting.

John Toeppen's presentation on 3-D computer travel through buildings, geologic formations and through your fossil collection was our February program, the meeting was well attended.

As of this time we don't have a program for the March General Meeting, Bill Bish sent a note to Tim Rose asking if he could give a presentation; that request is still open.

We will restart our door prizes at the meetings; the 4-H and Home School Groups will take over that part of the meeting. I want to thank both of the groups for their help and I also want to thank Jane Crone for all the years she did the door prizes for our meetings.

I have looked into doing another 'Field Trip in a Bucket' for a future meeting, I have information for several different companies in North Carolina, most, of them don't open until later in March. The mines in that area produce about ten different gemstones, so it should make for an interesting program.

I need ideas for a new series for the Lithogram. I have done the Alaskan and Cascade Volcanoes, Sand, and State Fossils; I will run out of the fossil series in six months.

NOTE: We need members to attend the Board Meetings. February 22 found us with only three officers at the meeting so we did not have a quorum present, so no business was taken care of. I sent out an email asking that the Shop Foremen to be at that meeting since most of the topics were about the shop, none of them showed up. We only need two or three members to attend the Board Meeting to have a quorum.

Several problems at the shop have been taken care of. First the water heater has been repaired and now there is a 4-Hour timer installed on it; this is to prevent the heater from being left on after the water is turned off. I am setting the temperature so as to make it comfortable to work on the wheels when the water is cold, PLEASE DO NOT CHANGE THE TEMPERATURE. The high temperature may have helped contribute to the soft diamond wheel failures.

Secondly there are new 600 and 3000 grit wheels installed, please take care of them. Please do not force the wheels to grind your samples; the grinding process takes time. The high-pressure on the soft diamond wheels may have also helped cause them to fail early. I do not believe the failures we have been having on the soft wheels are the fault of the manufacturers but more likely ours.

The Lithophiles spent \$315.45 for the repair of the water heater, electrical parts and the replacement diamond wheels. If we have to keep spending this type of money on keeping the shop operational we may have to raise the FEE for using the shop.

Shop Foremen, PLEASE read the 2013 Shop Rules, part #7, posted above the Dop-Wax Station. The shop foremen CAN NOT do any of their own work on the night they are on duty. They can come on another regular shop night for one FREE night for the night they were foreman. Also, shop foremen please keep the slab saw cutting slabs that will be needed for Lithorama.

The sign out sheet and the list of items that must be checked before locking up is temporarily on the White-Board. Please put your initials on the day you are foreman. This has been set-up for security reasons, so I don't find the comments in the area intended for initials very amusing.

I'm going to start working on redoing the shop rules; I hope to get help from Dick Friesen when he gets back in the area. I hope to get copies of the requirements that other societies use as a guide for redoing our shop rules. Once completed they will be submitted for the approval of the Lithophiles Officers, then will be sent to all the members of the Lithophiles. As never done in the past the last page will have an area for the members to sign that they understand what is required of them to use the shop; once signed it must be returned to the shop or dropped off at a meeting. Members will not be able to use the shop until the signed form is returned. There will also be a similar requirement and page for the foremen to sign. This is a requirement of many of the other societies that belong to the CFMS; its time

for our society to implement the same type of rules. I will present this information at a Board Meeting in the near future, and if it is approved the info will go out to the general membership.

I am sorry that it has gotten to this point, but equipment is being misused and the shop looks like a tornado hit it. There are rocks, unused equipment, and dust and dirt all over the shop. We may have to close the shop for a couple of Tuesdays for a good cleaning. As I have stated in the past this cleanup was requested by county inspectors when they came through the shop, the only thing we took care of was the removal of the propane heater.

At this time we need two, possibly three, Shop Foremen to help run the shop.

Triceratops horridus The name means "Three-horned Face.



The dinosaur roamed North America during the Late Cretaceous 68 to 65 million years ago. Many of the fossil bones have been found in the Hell Creek Formation that is found in Montana, North Dakota, South Dakota and Wyoming. This dinosaur was only found in North America.

It was 26 - 30 feet in length and weighing approximately 13000 to 16000 pounds. It's skull could get to be 8 feet in length. The animal would have lived in a similar way to our modern day rhinoceros. There beak-like mouth was more then likely used for grasping and striping foliage from plants and not for biting large branches and breaking them off.
