Minutes of the Board Meeting

October 25, 2012

The meeting was called to order at the Barn at 7:30 PM by President Rich Hunt.

Those also in attendance included Bill Beiriger, Dick Friesen and Andrea Rodrigues.

Treasure's Report: - There was no Treasurer's report.

Shop Report: - Dick Friesen reported that the bill for the new wheels was received. However, the wheels we received are secondhand with new facing. The vender has assured us that they will replace the facings (i.e., the abrasive surfaces) when these wear out. The floor needs repair before the Show as Stephanie's shoes went through the floor at a weak spot. The subfloor in the weak area, and probably adjacent areas, needs to be replaced. A work party needs to be undertaken. Details for completing the GFI installations are being worked out. Joe Bruns and Bill Beiriger inspected the wench and found it serviceable. Dick Friesen plans on purchasing a few hand tools for the Shop while in Arizona. He also loaned the Show a carving station. Bill Beiriger brought several towels for the shop.

Lithorama:-Several items were discussed regarding the Lithorama. Bill Beiriger has picked up the banner and will give it to the city for hanging. He has obtained permission to have Show flyers passed out at the Livermore schools. He is preparing buttons for kids to "fish out" at the kids' area. It was decided to have food booth tickets/vouchers for the Show exhibitors this year. At present, Jewel Train has not responded, or indicated that they will be one of our dealers. Dick Friesen gave Ellen (of Jewel Train) a call during the meeting and verified that they, in fact, will be one of our dealers. Payment and paperwork hopefully will be forthcoming. Empty milk cartons were brought for the Sloppy Joe meat mixture. Diane Carey will manage the Show food booth.

Minutes of the General Meeting

October 11, 2012

The meeting was called to order at 7.37 PM by President Rich Hunt at the Livermore Library Community Room A.

Guests: Our lone guest was Ms. Barbara Hepburn, daughter of the late Jim Gruver and his wife Ann.

Minutes: The minutes were approved as printed.

Treasure's Report: There was no Treasurer's report as Shelley Buchburger was not present.

Schools: -Bill Beiriger indicated that there was not much action on the school front although he has a tentative schedule from two teachers.

Shop Report: -Frank Gouveia reported that the installation of GFI devices is underway with two devices and two breakers needed. In addition, ground wires are needed on some of the circuits. There was some discussion, prompted by Sally Brown's concerns, whether or not we need to have LARPD's permission to make these Shop improvements. Member Bill Bish will look into the matter. The broken large saw blade has been replaced. The members responsible for the blade breakage have reimbursed the Club. Bill Beiriger mentioned that Shop photos taken during Shop sessions, show that not all people are wearing safety glasses. The second trim saw will be repaired soon.

Lithorama: Lee Davisson reported on recent developments for our Show. Things are coming together, according to Lee. Two Show chairpersons, including food chaired by Diana Carey and Gayla Langlois for the set-up dinner, were discussed. Rich Hunt mentioned that electronic media advertising is under way and that he will check with the young people at his church to see if there are any people willing to help with the Show (tear-down). As with last year, a donation will be made to the church. Bill Beiriger stated that the new banner has been purchased for 4th Street. With a 1.5% discount, the banner cost \$1,268.98 including tax. Lee indicated that any Club members help with the Show would be welcomed. Also, the passing out of the Show post cards is needed to spread the word. 

The Cascade Volcanoes of California, Oregon and Washington.

Mount Adams - Washington Last Eruption - 950 AD (?) 12,277 feet 46.206° N 121.490° W

Although lower in height than its neighbor to the north, Mount Rainier, massive Mount Adams rises above a lower topographic base and is second in volume only to Mount Shasta among volcanoes of the Cascade Range. The Mount Adams volcanic field includes the 200 cu km Mount Adams complex andesitic-dacitic stratovolcano, elongated along a NNW-SSE line, and more than 60 flank vents. Volcanism began about 940 thousand years ago (ka), with three main cone-building stages occurring at about 500, 450 and 30 ka. Adams was active throughout the Holocene, producing two dozen minor explosive eruptions from summit and flank vents. Six Holocene lava flows are located on the flanks between 2100 and 2600 m altitude. The most voluminous Holocene lava flows, some of which traveled 10 km or more, were emplaced between about 7 and 4 ka. The latest eruption about 1000 years ago produced a minor tephra layer and possibly a small lava flow down the east flank.



BUREAU OF LAND MANAGEMENT

Collection of Meteorites on Public Land

Policy/Action: The policy provides guidance to managers for administering the collection of meteorites on public lands in three use categories: casual collection of small quantities without a permit; scientific and educational use by permit under the authority of the Antiquities Act; and commercial collection of meteorites through the issuance of land use permits.

Casual Collection: Meteorites may be casually collected (i.e., free and without a permit), pursuant to BLM's regulations at 43 CFR 8365.1-5. In accordance with those regulations:

Collection of meteorites is limited to certain public lands. Public lands closed to casual collection include: developed recreation sites, certain units of the National Landscape Conservation System, areas excluded from casual collection in a Land Use Plan such as an Area of Critical Environmental Concern (ACEC) or a wilderness area, and areas closed by supplemental regulations;

Individuals are limited to collecting what can be easily hand-carried, up to a maximum of ten pounds of meteorites per individual, per year;

Only surface collection of meteorites using non-motorized and non-mechanical equipment is allowed (metal detectors may be used); and

Casually-collected meteorites are for personal use only, and may not be bartered or sold for commercial purposes.

Scientific and Educational Use:

Individuals or institutions intending to collect meteorites for scientific research or educational use must obtain an Antiquities Act permit through a Bureau of Land Management (BLM) State Office, in accordance with 43 CFR 3.

Applications for an Antiquities Act permit will be reviewed by the authorized officer in the BLM State Office with jurisdiction over the Cultural Resources program.

Collection amounts allowed for scientific or educational use are specified in the permit and are not subject to the limits (ten pounds) established for casual collection.

Meteorites collected under permit must be curated in an approved repository, and must meet the requirements for curation as defined in 36 CFR 79.

Commercial Collection:

Unless otherwise prohibited by laws, regulations, land use plans or closures, meteorites may be commercially collected by individuals possessing a land use permit issued under the authority of the Federal Lands Policy and Management Act (FLPMA). Land use permits are issued by the local BLM office in accordance with the regulations in 43 CFR 2920.

The applicant must pay an application fee, a purchase price based on either a unit price or a percentage of the fair market value of the removed material, and a reclamation fee as appropriate.

The permittee must comply with all environmental laws and regulations for surface disturbing activities on public lands.

Collection amounts allowed for commercial use are specified in the permit and are not subject to the limits (ten pounds) established for casual collection.

Timeframe: Effective immediately.
