Sand of the Month

IMPORTANCE OF LOCALITY INFORMATION

Accuracy of locality information has been reported several times in the newsletters of both the ISCS₁ and SCI₂. In this article I will show how locality information changes over time with history.

Below are four maps of Northern California. These maps show the counties at different periods in the states history.

As population changes one county will be divided into two or more counties. If population growth is rapid it may change again in a moderately short time.

Sometimes a county will be combined with an adjoining county. Klamath County in Northwestern California is no longer in existence and has become part of Del Norte, Humboldt and Siskiyou counties.

Population growth is not the only factor affecting a boundary change of a county. In the past the center of a river was the controlling factor of the county line, when the river changed coarse so did the countries boarder-line. Many towns are not rebuilt after being destroyed by hurricanes, earthquakes, etc.

Spelling changes can also change with time; they can be from a language change or copied wrong when a new map or database is produced. Here are two examples from California; Colusa County was Colusi and Yolo County was Yola.


There are also location changes. Here is a series of fictitious place names: Jackson, Jackson Station, and Jackson Junction. Jackson was the first town then the railroad came to the area about ten miles from town. Over time a town was built along the railroad and became Jackson Station and the junction of two roads between the two towns became Jackson Junction. Over time Jackson Station became a large town and Jackson and Jackson Junction were flooded by a reservoir. In time the railroad was removed and the town of Jackson Station was renamed Jackson. This scenario has happened many times in many parts of the United State.

There are also towns with the same name in a state or country. California has nine Centervilles and eight Agua Calientes, of which three are variations of Agua Caliente for the same local.

Many countries have their names changed after wars or other types of conflicts including the control of a country by a religious or ethnic group.

This type of locality information has probably not been a problem with sand collections in the United States because there are few sand collections dating from the 1800's. But it has been a big problem with mineral collections that have been passed down to museums and collectors around the world.

It's locality information changes like the above that make it more and more important to try and list the Latitude and Longitude for the collecting site. The best method is to use a GPS readout device. If you don't have one then try to get the information off a topographical map, a computer map with GPS readout, or find the Latitude and Longitude in a Geographic Thesaurus Database for the closest town.
